He yells, laughs, and explores this incredible place with genuine openness and intrigue.

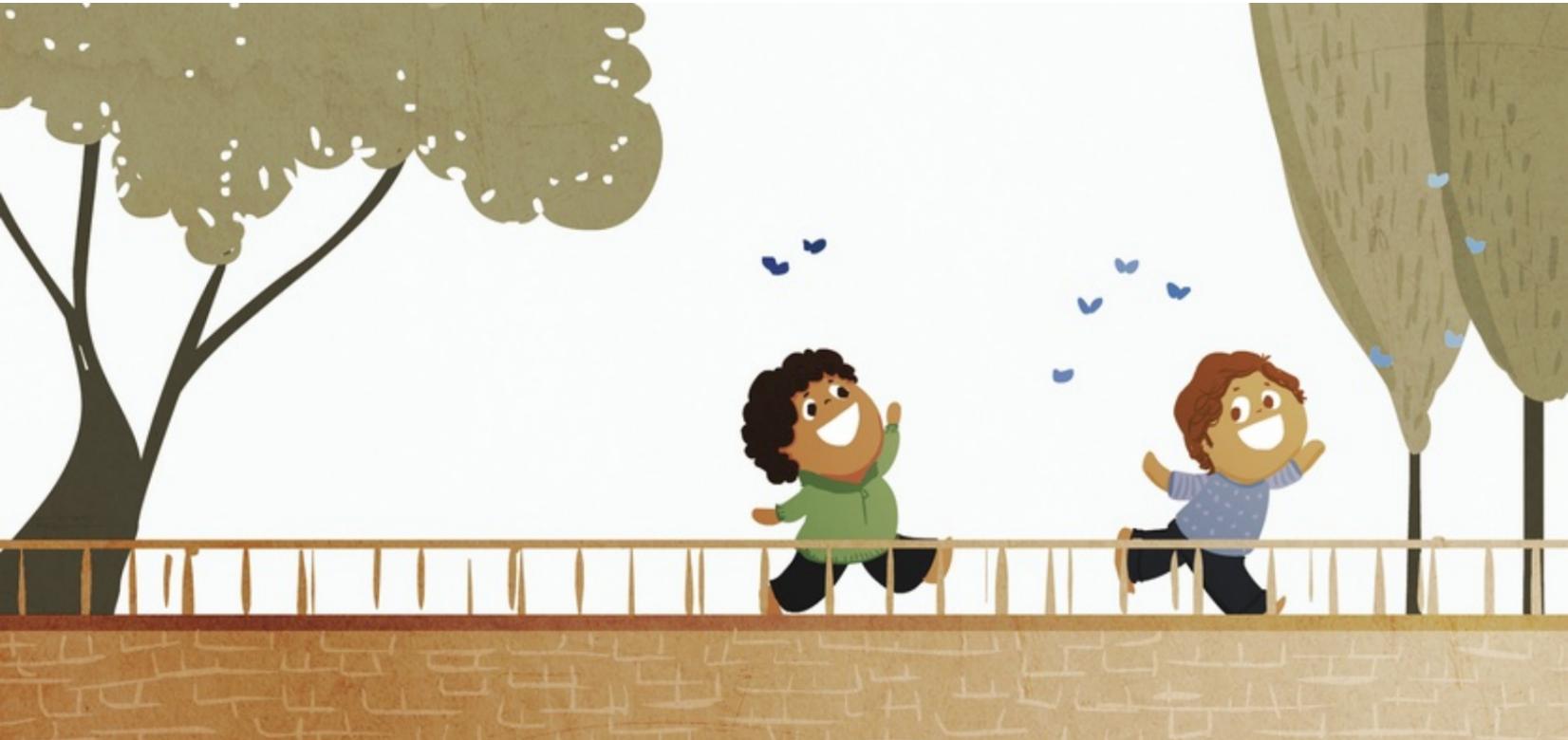


He lets his creative
